





Evacuations During Disasters Ingress and Egress Roadway Infrastructure

Evacuation Authority

Penal Code Section 409.5

• Provides Law Enforcement and Health Officers the authority to "close and/or evacuate" an area.



Notable Incidents

- 2017 Oroville Dam Spillway Failure, Butte County
- 2018 Carr Fire, Shasta County
- 2018 Camp Fire, Butte County
- 2020 Slater Fire, Siskiyou County



Lessons Learned

- Incidents can be unpredictable and do not go as planned
- Even the best planning and preparedness efforts may not be sufficient in an incident due to incident behavior.
- Lessons learned shape our ability effectively respond and save lives.



Evacuation Considerations

- Multi-Agency Coordination
- Phased evacuations
- Contra Flow
- Managing egress and ingress of evacuees and emergency response personnel.
- Unforeseen circumstances (broke down vehicles, traffic collisions)
- Access and Functional Needs (AFN) populations



Planning For Future Incidents

- Contra Flow
- Managing egress of evacuees and ingress of emergency response personnel.
- Unforeseen circumstances: broke down vehicles, traffic collisions
- Evaluation of roadway capacity and routes based on populations.
- Avoid creating "Isolated Islands of Humanity"



Planning For Future Incidents
